Everyone is charged up about Tudor NFL Super Bowl Electric Football!

The 1994 Electric Football season was an historic one for America's oldest and best-loved football game, Tudor NFL Super Bowl Electric Football. As NFL players donned "Throwbacks Uniforms," evoking memories of NFL greats from the past, Electric Football, the ultimate "Throwbacks" game, became more popular than ever.

The momentum actually began as the 1993 football season was drawing to a close. Former New York Giants linebacker and future Hall of Famer Lawrence Taylor appeared on a special Christmas episode of the Maury Povich Show. During the nationally-syndicated program, Taylor and Povich presented gifts to children at a hospital. When one of the children received an Electric Football game, Taylor called it "an original LT game".

Like the famed Green Bay Packers sweep of the Vince Lombardi era, the excitement surrounding Electric Football soon became unstoppable. As the 1994 season kicked off with ESPN featuring the game on network commercials, Fox Sports turned to Electric Football for its inaugural coverage of the National Football League. During a kids' segment called *Grunt & Punt*, Los Angeles Rams All-Pro running back Jerome Bettis was seen demonstrating his Electric Football moves at the historic Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, site of the first Super Bowl. The powerful fullback out of Notre Dame was as intimidating on the Electric Football field as he is on the NFL gridiron as he bulldozed his way to his first-ever Electric Football touchdown.



The Electric Football world then was "shocked" as Commissioner Michael Landsman announced the first-ever Tudor Super Bowl of Electric Football. In a contest open to the hundreds of thousands of Electric Football players around America, the competition challenged Electric Football fans to set up their ultimate offensive play and ideal defensive adjustment and then send videotapes of their creations to Miggle Toys. A panel of judges selected the four best entries and brought the winners to Chicago to play for the Tudor Super Bowl of Electric Football Trophy.

The response to this event was overwhelming. As Miggle Toys received hundreds of videotapes, the na-

tional media covered the game and its loyal followers. Newspapers such as *The Wall Street Journal*, *USA Today*, *The Sporting News* and *Chicago Tribune* wrote feature stories, while ABC's *Good Morning America Sunday* displayed the game on a Christmas special. SportFan Radio's Kate Delaney probably summed up the excitement that Electric Football fans felt when, during an interview with Landsman, she declared "I LOVE YOU!"

Now, as Electric Football prepares for the 1995 football season, the power surge continues to increase. Electric Football players all around the country have been forming new leagues and setting up local and regional tournaments. People who may not have played the game in years are pulling their old games out of their closets; while others, who have become caught up in the excitement, have purchased the game for the very first time.

Technological advances may be occurring daily, but Electric Football is here to stay.



ELECTRIC FOOTBALL NAMES EXPANSION TEAMS FOR 1995

This national event, which I believe will attract a multitude of loyal Electric Football players from around the country, not only will celebrate the spirit of the game, but also will mark the beginning of a year-long 50th Anniversary celebration for the game. Houston Oilers win First Annual Tudor Super Bowl of Electric Football

A week before the NFL kicked off Super Bowl XXIX in Miami, four of the best Electric Football teams in America gathered in Chicago for the First Annual Super Bowl of Electric Football on Saturday, January 21. The Houston Oilers, represented by Mark and Bill Klingbeil of Huntsville, Texas, were crowned the first Tudor Super Bowl of Electric Football champions after an intense day of competition on a cold, snowy day reminiscent of the famous "Ice Bowl Game" — the 1967 NFL Championship Game between the Green Bay Packers and the Dallas Cowboys.

"We had to have it in Chicago," Commissioner Michael Landsman said. "There's so much history here with guys like George Halas, Dick Butkus and Walter Payton being associated with the Bears."

In a contest open to the hundreds of thousands of avid Tudor NFL Super Bowl Electric Football players around America, the competition challenged Electric Football fans to set up their ultimate offensive play and ideal defensive adjustment and then send videotapes of their creations to Miggle Toys, Inc. A panel of judges selected by Miggle Toys viewed hundreds of entries and selected the four best, earning these competitors free trips to Chicago for the First Annual Tudor Super Bowl of Electric Football.

"Each little group didn't know there was another group," said Landsman about the hundreds of Electric Football players who sent in an entry. "They were surprised to find that there were so many Electric Football fans playing the game from coast to coast."

Rather than face the bitter conditions of Chicago's Soldiers Field, the Electric Football players gathered at Michael Jordan's Restaurant for the conference championships and the Super Bowl. The Klingbeils reached the title game by defeating the New York Jets, coached by Clem McAuliffe of Ocean Beach, Long Island, 32-19, in the AFC Championship Game. While the Klingbeils relied on a power running game similar to the Bum Phillips-coached Oilers of the 1970's, McAuliffe also turned back the clock to the glory days of Joe Namath by completing two touchdown passes during the contest.

"Their offensive line won the game," McAuliffe said. "I just couldn't stop their running."

The NFC Championship game featured a classic NFC Central Division matchup between the Chicago Bears, led by Myron Evans of Summerville, South Carolina, who advanced to the championship game by defeating the Detroit Lions coached by Gregg Hagley of Grand Rapids, Michigan, 16-12. Evans utilized his innovative approach of "pitching" the football from his quarterback Vince Evans to star running back Walter Payton to turn the tide the Bears' way.

The stage then was set for the Tudor Super Bowl of Electric Football. With SportsChannel Chicago's Steve Kashual doing the play-by-play and former Chicago Bear Bob Pickens acting as the referee, the Klingbeils' Oilers edged out Evans' Bears, 16-14. The Bears put up their traditional strong defense, but the Oilers eventually prevailed utilizing a variation of their famed trap play.

"Our first drive stalled inside the Chicago 10," Mark said. "We then had a fourth and two from the nine. My brother looked at me and said, 'Do you want to kick a field goal?' I said, 'It's the Super Bowl, let's go for it.'"

There were no losers at the Tudor Super Bowl of Electric Football. While the Klingbeils might have walked away with the EFL Trophy, each of the contenders received an official Wilson Super Bowl XXIX Football from Miggle Toys — and the respect and admiration of their fellow Electric Football players.

First Annual Super Bowl of Electric Football Team Profiles



Four of the country's top Electric Football teams competed to play in the First Annual Tudor Super Bowl of Electric Football on Saturday, January 21, 1995, at Michael Jordan's Restaurant in Chicago. Here are profiles of each team and how they qualified for the championship.

Houston Oilers — Mark and Bill Klingbeil of Huntsville, Texas

Mark, 28, and Bill, 31, Klingbeil, winners of the first-ever Tudor Super Bowl of Electric Football are social science majors at Sam Houston State University. The Klingbeils, who have played the game for over 20 years, qualified to compete in Chicago after they showed their classic trap play which they ran off right tackle resulting in an 80-yard touchdown. The play was lighting quick and if the viewer didn't have time to see it, they diagrammed the play on a chalkboard. The Klingbeils once attended a coaching class by Ron Randleman, head football coach at Sam Houston State, to help them improve their play calling. Detroit Lions - Gregg Hagley, Grand Rapids, Michigan

Gregg Hagley, 47, works as an advertising manager at Roger's Department Store in Grand Rapids. A veteran of more than 40 Electric Football seasons, Hagley reached the championship tournament after demonstrating his "Roll Red Right 88" play, which completely froze the opposing defense. The quarterback rolled all the way to the right sideline, stopped and completed a pass to a wide-open wide receiver 50 yards down the field. Hagley's son, Dan, acts as his assistant coach. Since returning to Grand Rapids, Hagley has been organizing the first-ever Grand Rapids Electric Football Invitational which will take place later this year. Gregg also has volunteered his services to Miggle Toys. All of those Electric Football players, who would like to speak with Gregg about forming leagues and tournaments, can call him at 616/247-1141. Chicago Bears — Myron Evans, Summerville, South Carolina

An assistant administrative computer science expert at the Charleston Air Force Base, Myron Evans, 30, has been playing Electric Football for over 25 years. Myron earned the chance to play in Chicago and represent his favorite team, the Bears, after demonstrating his formidable offense featuring the backfield tandem of Walter Payton and Vince Evans. In his tape, Myron had quarterback Evans pitch the ball to Payton on the right side, which resulted in an 80-yard touchdown run. On defense, Myron's set up was suffocating as he utilized an unstoppable 4-3-4 alignment.

"I have built my Chicago Bears into an Electric Football power-house throughout my hometown by running my famous offense, which I call the highly potent and lethal "Double QT Offense."

New York Jets — Clem McAuliffe, Ocean Beach, New York

A veteran of 20 Electric Football season, Clem McAuliffe plays an 80-game Electric Football schedule each year. Featuring 250 players in his collection, Clem qualified for Chicago after demonstrating his famous "Whiplash" play where his offensive line kicked out to the left and his running back appeared to be setting up for the screen. Clem had the entire defense sold on the screen, then his quarterback kept the ball and raced down the right sideline for a 55-yard gain. During the AFC Championship Game, Clem completed two touchdown passes.

Rodriguez has hand painted the end zones and the team logos on Electric Football fields for all 28 NFL teams...**THROWBACK:** Jim Brown may have retired more than 25 years ago, but he still suites up for **Paul Koroski of Lisbon, Maine**. Koroski owns a 1960 edition of the game and collects other old time versions of the game. Some of the best players in his collection include Brown and Lenny Moore...**GOODYEAR:** It's been a good year for **Alan Bundza of Boardman, Ohio**. Well maybe not a good year, but at least he has one flying over his Electric Football stadium. Bundza, who has built a replica of the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum around his field complete with archways and Olympic torch, has a miniature Goodyear Blimp hanging over his stadium...**SUPER BOWL SUNDAY:** Although the San Francisco 49er's captured Super Bowl XXIX last January in Miami, it is still Super Bowl Sunday for **Reginald Rutledge of Arlington, Texas**. Rutledge has built an exact model of Joe Robbie Stadium around his Electric Football field, and has included every possible feature including television trucks, team helmets that the players run through at the start of the Super Bowl, painted end zones in the team colors and names on the backs of each players jersey...**THE LONG STRAW WINS:** When **Gary Stallard's** triple option quarterback lines-up to kick a field goal, he better be accurate.
