


PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME WELCOMES ELECTRIC FOOTBALL

The game of Electric Football was officially enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, OH, in January 2001. And with this historic exhibit as the backdrop, Miggle Toys staged its

7th Annual Official Electric Football Super Bowl & Convention in the Hall's popular NFL Films Theatre from Jan. 19-21 of this year.

Kicking off right in the Hall of Fame on Friday evening, Jan. 19, with the largest Welcome Reception & Dinner in Convention history, the weekend in Canton was a record-breaker all the way around. Nearly 2,000 visitors came to enjoy the competition, displays, camaraderie and free raffle prizes, as well as to start or add to their Electric Football game and parts collections by stopping at the Miggle Toys Product Booth and other vendor tables inside the Convention room.

"It was an unbelievable weekend in a truly historic venue," stated EFL Commissioner Michael Landsman, who is also president of Miggle Toys, Inc., the manufacturers and marketers of Electric Football. "It was a great thrill to see so many Electric Football fans of all ages from all over the United States join us at our Convention this year. Our Convention gets bigger and more popular every year, and we are grateful to the Hall of Fame for hosting us this past January."

Once again, there was no charge for admission to the Convention, entry into any of the competitions,

exhibit space or raffle tickets.

Tournament play was exciting and highly-competitive. In addition to the AFC and NFC Wild Card Tournaments, the Conference Championship Games and the Super Bowl of Electric Football 7, the weekend's schedule also featured the Buzz Bowl for Women and the Spark Bowl for Kids. More Coaches participated in all of these tournaments than ever before, proving once again the continued growth and popularity of the game among men, women and youth of all ages.

On Sunday, Jan. 21, Commissioner Landsman announced the winners of Electric Football's top honors for 1999:

- The *Player of the Year Award* went to brothers **Bill and Mark Klingbeil**, who were instrumental last year in getting the Electric Football Exhibit into and also up and running in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Bill, from **Akron, OH**, and Mark, now living in **Corinth, TX**, were the winning Coaches in the first Electric Football Super Bowl in 1995, and Bill repeated on his own a year later.
- The *Newcomer of the Year Award* was presented to 14-year-old **Elly Hargrave** of **Nichelson**, **PA**, who won the Spark Bowl at the 2000 Convention. She is always available when called upon and is unselfish in her willingness to teach, and patiently play with, other young "newcomers" to the game.

A LETTER FROM THE COMMISSIONER MICHAEL LANDSMAN



Over the past couple of months, a lot of people have asked me what the highlight for me was at our 7th Annual Official Electric Football Super Bowl & Convention at the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, this past January.

Was it seeing the beautiful exhibit called "Electric Football Then And Now" that the Hall of Fame debuted just in time for our Convention? Sure that was electrifying, but it didn't top my list.

Perhaps it was watching the intense, exciting and highly-skilled play of our Super Bowl Championship Game on Sunday afternoon? Yes, that was as good as it gets, but not totally the best part of my weekend.

What about the record 2,000 or so people who visited our Convention over the two days we were open at the Hall of Fame? Yes, that was exhilarating and gratifying, but not number one to me.

Then how about all the TV, radio and print coverage the weekend's activities generated locally, regionally and nationally? Of course we were delighted with the media "buzz" that the game, the Convention and our Super Bowl received, but that, too, didn't stack up as my first choice.

So what exactly got my heart beating and my emotions growing the most? I'll tell you—it was

seeing some 32 boys and girls between the ages of five and 15 sign up for and play in our *Spark Bowl for Kids*.

Since we have been promoting Electric Football for nearly a decade as a game for the entire family—and as a positive substitute for anti-social computer and video games—nothing could feel more worthwhile or gratifying than to see so many boys and girls, and moms and dads, spending so much time together having fun, learning and sharing. It means that not only is our "message" getting out there, but that it is falling on very receptive ears.

A little history lesson would be appropriate here. When we first introduced the Spark Bowl two years ago in Philadelphia, nine youngsters participated in the tournament. Last year, in Washington, DC, we nearly doubled the field—to 16. And this year, with 32 "Coaches" in the field, we did double the number of young people who competed in the event.

In fact, the Spark Bowl was so popular this year that we decided to divide the field into two Divisions—the Juniors (ages five to nine) and the Seniors (10 to 15). It worked out great, as play was highly-competitive and very skillful, with the usual EFL mix of great sportsmanship and camaraderie. At the end of the day, we were able to present trophies to the two Junior co-champions, as well as to the Senior champion and runner-up.

At this time, on behalf of both my wife Delayne and myself, we would like to express

our sincere thanks to the dozens and dozens of people who helped make this year's Official Electric Football Super Bowl & Convention the best ever. First, we would like to commend Ira Silverman and his team at Silverman Media&Marketing Group who did their usual excellent job of coordinating the Convention and the tournaments for us. Then there were all the folks at the Pro Football Hall of Fame-especially Joe Horrigan and Tricia Savarese-who helped make the weekend run so smoothly. And there were the many volunteer Coaches, far too many to name here, who gave of their time so unselfishly to tutor others on game rules and strategies, help run the pre-Super Bowl competition games, kids' tournaments and so many other important activities.

And last, but certainly not least, our EFL helmets come off to Kathy Holford, her husband, Jim, and her grandson, Jim, for their dedication and all their tireless work at the Miggle Toys booth.

BELL RINGS UP SECOND STRAIGHT EFL SUPER BOWL WIN

Ron Bell, an assistant district attorney from New Orleans, became the third Coach to lead his team to consecutive EFL Super Bowl Championships when his Miami Dolphins came from behind to defeat David Redmond, Jr.'s Atlanta Falcons, 30-24, in the Super Bowl 7 of Electric Football on Sunday, Jan. 21, 2001.

Held during the 7th Annual Official Electric Football Convention at the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, OH, this year's Super Bowl was one of the tightest and most hotly contested title games in league history. It took a late fourth quarter drive by Miami, culminating in an eightyard TD pass from Dan Marino to Mercury Morris with just seven seconds left in the game to give Bell's Dolphins the victory.

For the second straight year, Bell qualified for the AFC title game via the videotape route. His VHS submission, which the judges again felt demonstrated the greatest playing skill, creativity and persuasiveness of all entries, earned the 32-year-old Bell a free trip to Ohio and that spot in

the AFC championship tilt. His opponent in that game, **Paul "Raiderman" Bartels of York, PA**, qualified for the right to face Bell by winning the AFC Wild Card Tournament on Saturday, Jan. 20.

Passing was the key to victory in the AFC title



GETTING CONNECTED WITH...CHET COPPOCK



Chet Coppodk

Chet Coppock is one of the most distinguishable—and most distinguished—sports journalists in America today. At 6'4", he is an imposing presence. Add in the blond hair, the wardrobe full of colorful suspenders, the strong voice and the knowledgeable mind, and no wonder Coppock has carved out a successful career on radio and television for the past quarter-century.

Born and raised in Chicago, Coppock attended Columbia College and has held a number of sports broadcasting positions over his career. These posts have included producer of the Milwaukee Bucks Radio Network and the voice of Roller Derby in 275 TV market worldwide in the '70s; weekday anchor for WMAQ-TV, a sports reporter for WMAQ radio and host of his own radio sports talk show in Chicago in the '80s; and host of TV's "The Back Table," FOX Sports Chicago's "The Game Room" and a nationally-seen five-nights-a-week sports talk show on the NewSport cable television network out of New York in the '90s.

Today, Coppock is comfortably back in Chicago doing what he cherishes the most and does the best—talking sports on the radio with stars and listeners on his weekend evenings "Coppock On Sports" show on The Sporting News Radio Network (Saturdays & Sundays, 7-11 p.m. Eastern Time).

Coppock recently spent some time on the phone with PLUGGED IN! talking about his lifelong love affair with Electric Football. Here are the highlights of that conversation:

PLUGGED IN!: When did you first start playing EF?

Chet Coppock: I was raised in a cold weather environment—Chicago. What the winters meant

to me was snow, frostbite and Electric Football. I was about four or five when I first played the game. Even at that age, I was a big fan of professional football. What I remember—and this might sound precocious—is that I knew the names and teams of all the great players. Guys like Sam Huff, Lenny Moore, Johnny Unitas and, of course, Chicago Bears players like Rick Casares and Willie Galimore. So, for a little Chet Coppock, playing Electric Football was a big thrill.

PI!: What's your first recollection about playing Electric Football at that age?

CC: I remember putting that little felt ball between the ball carrier's arm and ribcage and lining up the players. I was using the 'run and shoot' offense when I was five years old. What I didn't realize then, but I recognize now, is that the real splendor of the game was its innocence.

PI!: With whom did you usually play the game? cc: First, the fun of the game for me was that I could play with my friends. I'd usually play with my friends Ronnie, Gary and Freddy. I'd be the Chicago Bears and they'd be the Baltimore Colts or the San Francisco 49ers. But I'd also play for hours on end by myself. I'd have 'The Mickey Mouse Club' or 'American Bandstand' on in the background, and I'd be playing Electric Football. Even the players going around 360 degrees lent the game a charm. It had those given moments when your running back or your wing back took the football and somehow found his way to the end zone. It was just a great feeling of exhilaration. I think, as a kid, I probably enjoyed playing Electric Football more than playing baseball or basketball because there was something about the game that was challenging . . . it made a young boy feel part of the National Football League.

PII: You told us the you were a big football fan even at an early age. How did that translate your passion to your Electric Football experiences? CC: There were many times when I was playing the game that I'd line up my guys and say, 'My backfield is the Four Horsemen' or 'My backfield is Bronco Nagurski and Red Grange' or 'My quarterback is Sid Luckman.' The real charm of the game was that I was living out these youthful fantasies with the simplicity of the game. You lined up the players and 'boom' it happened.

This very small—yet panoramic—electric football field would explode with players going in this direction and that direction. I must admit I was a great fantasizer with Electric Football.

P!!: How would you describe the enjoyment you had as a child playing a hands-on game like Electric Football vs. the video and computer games that kids play today?

CC: I think it's all about charm. My son Tyler, who's 12, is video-game crazy, and I think it's fine and harmless-but I also think the games today are so scientific and so technologicallyadvanced that the charm is gone. In Electric Football, there was an innocence—you got to be the creative source along with the game. Video and computer games today eliminate or sever the kind of interaction we had as kids with Electric Football. I just wish today's kids could have the fun and enjoyment we had, based on the simplicity of taking that little felt swab, putting it in the ball carrier's grasp, placing him on the football field and watching everything unfold. The fact that the game took time, and that you had to re-set the players after every play, only added to the charm of the game.

PI!: You'll be getting a new NFL Super Bowl Electric Football Game at your home shortly. What will be the first things you'll want to tell and show Tyler about the game?

cc: The first things I will show him are that he will become his own coach and the fact he won't be relying on video sources to provide him with information. He will become the creative source. I'll have fun with him. I'll probably tell him, 'Tyler, I'll be the Green Bay Packers and Coach Vince Lombardi . . . and you can be Mike Ditka and the Chicago Bears.' We'll play the game. and I'll try to stump him a little bit. But I think what will be cool about it is we won't have a computer in the way. As father and son, we will have to interact with each other. That's going to be the joy of it to me. Tyler, who is a lightsout sports fan-he probably knows more than I do-he will get a great kick out of the game. He's going to love it because he's going to have the opportunity to be his own coach.



IFL EFL LEAGUE LAUNCHED IN SOUTHERN MICHIGAN WITH UNIQUE GUIDELINES & RULES

Leave it to **Brian Wittkop, Sr.**, a vice president with Monroe Glass in **Monroe, MI**, to come up with some innovative and amusing wrinkles to launch a new EFL League in the Southern Michigan area.

A long-time Electric Football coach and devotee, Brian has also built several over-sized Electric Football fields on legs, painted his own players and collected Electric Football memorabilia for years. So it will be no surprise if his soon-to-debut **International Football League** (**IFL**) becomes one of the most unusual and cutting-edge leagues in the country.

Together with fellow coaches **Michael Boberg, Seth Ord, son Christopher Wittkop**and **Jeff Raymer**, Wittkop's league will kick off
its inaugural season in August 2001.

PLUGGED IN! recently had a chance to discuss the IFL with Brian Wittkop, and here are the highlights of that conversation:

PLUGGED IN! (PI!): How did you come up with the idea for a completely original league in regards to teams?

Brian Wittkop (BW): At home, we basically had been collecting all of the pro teams, plus we had painted a lot of college teams. My son, Chris, suggested that we start our own league, almost like the XFL. We started kicking around names and color schemes with friends and colleagues and, before we knew it, the guys were calling out great names for teams. We agreed that each franchise "owner" would have to come up with a name, city and color scheme and that they would be required to paint their own team, number them and, of course, create a roster, which means you have to make up the names of your players.

PII: What are the names of the teams in the IFL?

BW: Thus far, we have the Las Vegas

Gamblers, Boston Dragons, Los Angeles Lynx, Orlando Thunder, New Jersey Highwaymen, Richmond Rebels, Michigan Wolves and Birmingham Mustangs, who are each owned entirely by one of our league members; and the Toronto Lumberjacks, Tulsa Knights, San Antonio Gunslingers and Portland Rockets, which are co-owned and co-coached for now.

PI!: But the IFL takes it even further, doesn't it?

BW: Yes, we do. We have been contacting the city halls in each of the member cities and applying to register the names as a DBA (doing business as) account. Some cities have been very cooperative, while others won't register the names to out-of-towners. But it's fun trying.

PII: Was it difficult to find people to join your league?

BW: Yeah, it was a little bit. The coaches in our league now are mainly guys I work with . . . they're younger, basically my son Chris' age (20). I said I'd provide the pizza at games. We recently held a college tournament and they REALLY got into the game. By the end of the day, it was like they had been playing Electric Football forever. And their interest level has kept up since then. I think there may be a few other people I used to play with who might want to join, but their work schedules are tough. Not like these "kids"—the older guys have responsibilities. (Laughs)

PI!: How many games will be in your first season, and what will the playoff format be like?

BW: We'll play eight games per team in 2001, and divide the teams into three divisions. At the end of the season, each division winner, and one wild card team, will qualify for the playoffs.

PI!: Where will the games be played?

BW: It will vary. Some will be played at my house, some at the community center and others in the conference room in the shop where I work.

PI!: What rules will you use in the IFL?

BW: We'll pretty much be sticking to the Official Electric Football Rules provided by Miggle Toys. But we will allow stacking on running plays. If you can't pass around it, then you're in trouble. We also play with a clock—the Official Electric Football Scoreboard—and have two time-outs per half. The clock only stops for incomplete passes and going out of bounds in the last five minutes of each half.

PI!: Why do you think Brian Wittkop is a successful EFL Commissioner?

BW: I like working with kids and young people. I've always enjoyed being around them. I guess I've never really grown up that way. I have the patience to deal with their unpredictability. You have to be patient with them.

PI!: Are there opportunities for other coaches to join the IFL?

BW: Absolutely. And we'll even help them with painting their teams, numbering them and developing rosters. They can just contact me and we'll get the ball started for them.

PI!: How does your wife feel about you spending so much time with Electric Football?

BW: Oh, she has no problem with it. She's not into it, but it doesn't bother her. She gave up her sewing room so I can have my electric football room; how does that sound?

PI!: What advice would you give to someone who wants to start a similar EFL league?

BW: Find creative people. Be patient with people. Make it fun—that's what we've tried to do. If you make it too competitive, then it takes the fun out of it. Everyone gets to build his own team from the ground up—and when you make something your own, people tend to enjoy it more.

The Pied Piper of Electric Football

This story is not a fairy tale. It just sounds like one.

Once upon a time, **Don Smith**, a private contractor who owns his own maintenance company, decided to play "godfather" to 10 inner-city youth in his hometown of **Portsmouth**, **VA**. These were not "bad" kids, just a little undirected, undisciplined and unfocused. He would introduce them to his favorite game, get them excited and motivated and, perhaps, make a difference in their lives.

So Smith, 37, who is originally from Mt. Vernon, NY, started the *P-Town Kids EFL* last Christmas with nine boys and one girl between the ages of eight and 14. One of these rookie Coaches was his 12-year-old son, D.C., an honor student who finished second at this year's Spark Bowl at the Electric Football Convention.

To get the league up and running, Smith not only contributed about 70% of the game boards and accessories, but spent considerable time teaching the youngsters how to paint the players, as well as the basic rules and strategies of Electric Football. Today, he still devotes an average of 14-20 hours a week to the youngsters.

"Our area has a lot of kids who don't have a lot of opportunities," Smith told PLUGGED IN!, "so I tried to talk them into doing something constructive and enjoyable. Christmas-time was a perfect opportunity to start the league. You know, a lot of parents go into a financial hole at that time—I felt bad that many of them couldn't afford

the Electric Football stuff and I didn't want any kids to feel left out."

But why Electric Football?

"Quite simply, it's the best game out there," asserts Smith, who has been playing Electric Football since he was 10. "I call it 'moving chess."

Smith, who also is commissioner of his adult TBA (Tidewater Buzzball Association) of Hampton Roads, feels there are great lessons in the game in addition to the fun and challenge of lining up the players in strategic formations. "One of the things I like about Electric Football," he notes, "is it teaches kids sportsmanship. With a video game, you get a lot of fussing and fighting, but Electric Football is more hands-on. I teach sportsmanship

first, and technique comes second."

The Electric Football Pied Piper of Portsmouth always opens his own home to P-Town Kids EFL games, but is delighted that other parents also want to be active in the league and act as hosts when their child has a "home" game. "My wife, Lisa, who is a police officer, is trying to shift the league into a recreation center, which would be great for everyone," Smith adds.

Smith credits Lavell Shelton of Greenville, SC, a two-time EFL Super Bowl Champion, with breaking the ground when it comes to using Electric Football as a vehicle for community work. "I met Lavell back in 1985 . . . and I truly felt blessed. He was working with his local YMCA teaching kids the game, and he became a mentor to me because he started doing this back in the '80s, when it wasn't so fashionable," Smith concedes.

And what is the moral of this story?

"When I first met a lot of these kids," Smith concluded, "they really didn't have much to do other than hang out. Now, when they are playing Electric Football, they really seem to be enjoying themselves and are having lots of fun. They also seem to understand commitment and sportsmanship a lot better, and they now have a positive outlet for their time and energy."

ELLY HARGRAVE, 2000 NEWCOMER OF THE YEAR


While many 14-year-old girls spend their time watching MTV's "TRL" and chit-chatting on the phone about boys, 2000 EFL Newcomer of the Year Elly Hargrave of Nichelson, PA, would rather belt a softball deep into left-field, practice her piano or test her skills on the EFL gridiron.

The Miggle Toys Newcomer of the Year Award is given out annually to a player who is both a rising star, as well as someone who has already made an impact on the game. It is based on the previous 12-month period between January and December, and takes a number of factors into consideration.

"Elly had a great 2000," noted Delayne
Landsman, wife of EFL Commissioner Michael
Landsman. "Not only did she win last year's Spark
Bowl—against 15 boys, I must add—but she also
demonstrated a great knowledge of the game, as
well as much spirit and affection for the EFL."

Elly returned to the 2001 Convention in Canton, OH, this past January adorned in her favorite Philadelphia Eagles' Donovan McNabb jersey. She entered the Buzz Bowl For Women and reached the Championship Game, where she fell to perennial EFL powerhouse Joyce Rogers of Akron, OH

Apparently, she learned quickly. "From that point on, I became more interested, and I played more often."

Elly now practices her Electric Football—whenever she can fit it into her busy schedule—with her father or "occasionally my brother (Lenny Hargrave), when we don't argue."

Her regular routine, which centers on attending classes and competing on the softball and field hockey teams at Lackawanna Trail High School, also includes games of sandlot football with the guys, membership in a youth group and playing the piano. She reports that while math is her best subject, her favorite one is science.

While many things come swiftly and easily to Elly, trying to convince her friends to play electric football has not. "I've tried to introduce Electric Football to my guy friends, but so far only one has been interested. We play the game when he comes over, though."

But for Elly Hargrave, Electric Football is a "Family Affair." Even with her extremely busy and rigorous schedule, she still puts aside time to play her favorite game with her dad, brother and mom (Cindy Hargrave, who also played in al three EFL Buzz Bowls). Her one regret? "I am sorry to say that I just do not have the time to play in a league. But I'm glad to be able to play with my family, though." Elly, that's all that really counts, anyway.



KLINGBEIL BROTHERS NAMED EFL'S

Bill and Mark Klingbeil, who collaborated to win the first-ever Super Bowl of Electric Football at Michael Jordan's Restaurant in Chicago in January 1995, were named the EFL's Co-Players of the Year for 2000 at the 7th Annual Official Electric Football Super Bowl & Convention held this past January in Canton, OH.

Bill, who resides in Akron, OH, and Mark, now living in Corinth, TX, were instrumental in developing the idea to have the history and development of the game of Electric Football displayed at the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, as well as shepherding the process along until it reached fruition. It was Bill and Mark who first contacted the Hall of Fame four years ago, pushed for meetings with Joe Horrigan, the vice president of public relations & exhibits, and kept following-up with Horrigan for the last few years.

"I'll never forget our first meeting with Joe Horrigan," Mark Klingbeil recalled for PLUGGED IN! "We weren't quite sure how he would respond. As it turned out, he was very interested in setting up a display, as he too remembered playing the game. It seemed like we talked for hours, swapping stories and sharing memories."

Added Bill Klingbeil: "After that first meeting, we would call Joe periodically. It is absolutely incredible that it all worked out. As time went on, it would start to seem like a dream. But Joe always reassured us that he was working on making it happen. We always 'believed' again after talking to him."

Commented Michael Landsman, president of Miggle Toys and commissioner of the EFL: "All of us in the Electric Football community owe a great debt to Bill and Mark Klingbeil. It was their idea, initiative, energy, persuasiveness and perseverance that made this dream into a reality. I know they worked very, very hard on this project—all for the good of the game. They were a unanimous choice to be named Co-Players of the Year for 2000."

Part of the Klingbeils still remains in the Hall of Fame—you see, all of the items Joe Horrigan has put on display came from the Klingbeil's storied and valuable personal collection of Electric Football game boards, players and equipment, except for the current Miggle Toys fields.

Concluded Horrigan: "Bill and Mark were tireless and effective advocates for Electric Football ever since we first talked. Their exuberance and affection for the game is contagious, and they eventually convinced me and my associates at the Hall of Fame that Electric Football did merit an exhibit in our building."

Great work Bill and Mark! And congratulations on your much-deserved recognition as the 2000 EFL Co-Players of the Year. ■

ONE FUNNY PİLEMMA

In this issue of PLUGGED IN!, again we share an e-mail from the world of emerging technologies. Read how one savvy "Tech Support" person helps out a "Troubled User" who ran into a situation way beyond his expertise. How many coaches can relate?

Dear Tech Support:

Last year, I upgraded from Girlfriend 7.0 to Wife 1.0, I soon noticed that the new program began unexpected child processing that took up a lot of space and valuable resources. No mention of this was included with the product information.

In addition, Wife 1.0 installed itself into all other programs, and now launches during system initialization, where it monitors all other system activity. Applications such as Poker Night 7.5, Drunken Boys Night 2.5, Electric Football 10.3, Hunting and Fishing 5.0 and Racing 3.6 no longer run, crashing the system whenever selected.

I can't seem to keep Wife 1.0 in the background while attempting to run my favorite applications. I'm thinking about going back to Girlfriend 7.0, but the Uninstall doesn't work on Wife 1.0.

Please help! Thanks.

A Troubled User

Dear Troubled User:

This is a very common problem that men complain about. It is due to a primary misconception among men. Many people upgrade from Girlfriend 7.0 to Wife 1.0 thinking that it is merely a Utilities & Entertainment program.

Wife 1.0 is an OPERATING SYSTEM, and is designed by its creator to run everything! It is also impossible to delete Wife 1.0 and return to Girlfriend 7.0. Hidden operating system files cause Girlfriend 7.0 to emulate Wife 1.0 so nothing is gained.

It is impossible to uninstall, delete or purge the program files from the system once installed. You cannot go back to Girlfriend 7.0 because Wife 1.0 is designed to not allow this.

Some have tried to install Girlfriend 8.0 or Wife 2.0 but end up with more problems than in the original system. Look in your Wife 1.0 manual under "Warnings: Maintenance/Child Support."

I recommend that you keep Wife 1.0 and work on improving the situation. I suggest installing the background application program Yes_Dear to alleviate software augmentation. Having installed Wife 1.0 myself, I also suggest that you read the entire section regarding "General Partnership Faults (GPFs)."

You must assume all responsibility for any faults and problems that occur, regardless of their cause. You will also find GPFs tend to be somewhat cyclical, occurring approximately 28 days apart. The best course of action is to enter the command C:/APOLOGIZE. Avoid excessive use of C:/YES_DEAR because ultimately you will have to use the APOLOGIZE command before the system will return to normal anyway.

Remember, the system will run smoothly as long as you take the blame for all GPFs. Wife 1.0 is a great program, but tends to require very high maintenance. Wife 1.0 comes with several support programs such as Clean_and_Sweep 3.0, Cook_It 1.5 (which replaces Burn_It 1.0) and Do_Bills 4.2. You must, however, be very careful how you use these programs.

Improper use will cause this system to launch the program Nag_Nag 9.5. Once this happens, the only way to improve the performance of Wife 1.0 is to purchase additional software. I recommend Flowers 2.1 and Diamonds 6.5 should this happen.

game, as Bell's Dolphins held on for a convincing 24-14 win over Raiderman's Oakland Raiders.

The NFC championship game was a battle between Coach Redmond of **Decatur**, **GA**, who had earned a free trip to Canton and a spot in the NFC title game by winning the Southeast Regional Qualifying Tournament in Atlanta in December 2000. His opponent was **Myron Evans of Philadelphia**, who captured the NFC Wild Card Tournament with a strong run through four opponents the day before.

Defense took over in the NFC Championship game, however, as Redmond's Falcons shut out Evans' Philadelphia Eagles, 14-0.

By winning this year's see-saw Super Bowl, Bell joins Bill Klingbeil, originally of Houston, TX, and now from Akron, OH, and Lavell Shelton of Greenville, SC, as the only back-toback winners of the Super Bowl of Electric Football.

In the finals of the Buzz Bowl for Women, Joyce Rogers of Akron, OH, successfully accomplished a three-peat by coaching her Cincinnati Bengals to a 6-0 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles, who were led by 14-year-old Elly Hargrave of Nicholson, PA. Rogers, EFL's first-ever Newcomer of the Year award winner in 1998, has now won all three Buzz Bowls ever contested. Her opponent, incidentally, was presented with the Newcomer of the Year Award for 2000 at this year's EFL Convention.

With a record 32 participants, this year's **Spark Bowl For Kids** was divided into two groups—boys and girls ages five to nine and youngsters 10 to 15.

In the Junior Division, the title was shared by Dylan Vitali, age five, of Cleveland, OH, and Cooper Lycan, six, of Fairfax Station, VA. In the Senior Division, Chris Boosalis, 12, of Montgomery, MD, defeated D.C. Smith, 12, of Portsmouth, VA, in the title game. All of the "rookie" coaches received trophies for their efforts, as well as a huge round of applause from the fans in attendance. ■
